Brouillard Honored

During the annual Ambassador's luncheon at the Rhode Island Convention Center, "Recommend RI" honored Joe Brouillard for his immense contributions to the economy in the State of Rhode Island.

The Fall North American Bridge Championships, formerly held in Boston, were brought to Rhode Island through the efforts of Joe Brouillard, Helen Pawlowski and the staff of the Rhode Island Sports Commission.

Because of both the large audience and the duration of the tournament, this was an incredibly lucrative event for the state; with a direct spend impact of \$4.85 million. The tournament also filled hotel rooms during Thanksgiving week, which is traditionally a slower period.

In addition, Joe also helped the Providence Warwick Convention & Visitors Bureau secure the annual New England District Ocean State Regional Bridge Tournament which takes place annually at the Crowne Plaza in Warwick. For the second time Joe has agreed to serve as local co-chair when the Summer North American Bridge Championships returns to Rhode Island in July of 2021, an event that has a projected direct spend impact of \$6.5 million.

When you add up all of the bridge events that Joe has helped bring to Rhode Island, his efforts have resulted in about \$13.3 million in direct spend revenue for his home state. That is a tremendous contribution to the state's economy and "Recommend Rhode Island" recently celebrated Joe's contributions by presenting him with the Valued Partner Award.

The Rhode Island Unit 145 and District 25 are extremely thankful to have a volunteer as committed as Joe Brouillard.

Lesson: Losing Trick Count

You are dealt the following hand: K65432, 7, A743, 53. Partner opens 1C, you respond 1S and partner jumps to 4S. Most likely you Pass and routinely make 12 tricks. Partner had: AQ87, J4, K5, AK 976. You shrug, "no one will bid that" and find that two pairs did as you collect your average minus, "So and so always overbids." Did they?

The Bridge Bulletin is currently running a series of articles starting in May that revisits the topic of Losing Trick Count (LTC). This is well worth the read, but please read on as I will try to create an overview that complements that series.

LTC is only useful when a fit is found either in combination or as a stand alone holding. If you have AKQ7632 in your own hand, by definition you have a fit.

Here is the simplest version. If you are missing the A K or Q in a suit each of those missing honors is a loser to a maximum of three losers per suit. For example, if you hold A x x or longer you have two losers. K x x and Q x x are two losers. A Q x and K Q x are both one loser. This is not a perfect science. Note, the fourth card and longer are never counted as losers.

Minimum openings typically have 7 losers. Here is an example: A Q 7 3 2, K 3 2, A 4 3, 9 8. S = 1, H = 2, D = 2, C = 2. Total LTC = 7. Note if the opening hand were A Q 7 3 2, K 3 2, A 4 3 2, 9 this hand would have a LTC of 6. Distribution always affects LTC.

To complete the rule, add your combined losers and subtract that number from 24. The result is the number of tricks you can reasonably expect to make. You can call this the rule of 24. If your LTC is 14 you can expect to make 10 tricks (24-14=10). If your LTC is 12 you can make 12 tricks (24-12=12),

Let's look at the hand your were originally dealt: K x x x x x, x, A x x x x x x. In spades you have 2 losers (LTC = 2), in hearts you have 1 loser (you cannot have more losers than cards in the suit), in diamonds you have 2 losers (missing K Q) and in clubs you have 2 losers. This is a 7 loser hand.

Now let's consider partner's opener. If he had a 6 or 7 loser hand with support he would bid 2S. He figures you as responder have the typical 9 loser hand. (7 + 9 = 16, 24 - 16 = 8) If he makes a jump raise to 3S he would likely have a 5 loser hand. Why 5? The typical minimum response shows a 9 loser hand such as K x x x, K x x, Q x x, J x x. It takes a combined 14 loser hand to produce 10 tricks. Partner assumes you have the 9 losers. Therefore 9 + 5 = 14, 24 - 14 = 10. You have a play for 10 tricks. With these cards do you bid game or pass? Ok, let's return to your original holding. Partner showed a 4 loser hand (actually he has 5) by jumping to 4. You have a 7 loser hand. 4 + 7 = 11. 24 - 11 = 13! Don't go crazy here, sometimes partner overbids. Bid 4NT and proceed. Partner will show two key cards and the Q of trumps (you do play Key Card?). You assume twelve tricks are odds on. On the actual combined holding 7 may make if the opponents fail to lead a heart. This takes us back to my first question. Did the opponents overbid?
