# Learning Better Bridge

This year the Rhode Island Bridge Association is committing itself to attracting new duplicate bridge players around the state, and helping to promote teaching efforts and new player events by clubs. All of the bridge clubs in Rhode Island offer various kinds of instruction. If you're a bridge player and you know anyone who might be interested in learning bridge or trying a duplicate game, you can steer them to any of the clubs and club directors.

Clint Wright, director of the Bridge Club of Northern Rhode Island, has been offering a non-sanctioned instructional game on Friday evenings for six years now, with consistent attendance by interested bridge players. A number of people now playing duplicate at Rhode Island clubs began with this hands-on-the-cards experience.

The first half hour of each session is devoted to a brief review of selected hands, the introduction of a new convention, and general bridge questions to get people started. Then, everyone, novice and up, plays bridge with a teaching supervisor. Any player is allowed to ask any question about the bidding, play of the hand, or defense, during this time.

"For new players, this really helps develop their confidence," says Clint Wright, "and it de-mystifies the game in a non-threatening environment. It has the benefit of improving the play of beginner to intermediate players, and in some cased we've found that it drives new players to the sanctioned day games."

The non-sanctioned game is held at Slatersville Congregational Church, 25 Greene St., North Smithfield, on Fridays at 6:30 p.m. For information contact Clint Wright at cwright 1717@gmail.com.

## A BIT OF RI BRIDGE HISTORY

# A 52-year love affair

It was the summer of 1939. Eugenia Tellef was a registered nurse living in the Pittsburgh area when she got a phone call from Rhode Island that changed her life.

Tellef, a widow with two small children, was known as an avid duplicate bridge player and teacher. Two friends, insurance claims adjusters, had gone to Rhode Island after the 1938 hurricane. In the two months they were there, they discovered there were no duplicate games.

When Tellef picked up the phone, one of her friends said: "Pack your suitcase. This is virgin territory for duplicate."

Thus began a 52-year love affair for the feisty Tellef, who only recently retired as the grande dame of bridge in Rhode Island. At 91, she is still going strong despite her decision to give up her weekly duplicate game in Cranston.

Tellef did indeed pack up and move to Rhode Island. Before long, she was teaching bridge three times a day seven days a week, and had founded the Rhode Island Bridge Association.

"She went from one end of the state to the other," said Ralph Mastrangelo, who learned bridge from Tellef. Mastrangelo was the 1990 Rookie of the Year in the Ace of Clubs competition.

Mastrangelo said he admired Tellef for the way she ran her duplicate games. "There were no prima donnas," he said. "She treated everyone the same." Mastrangelo said her philosophy of running bridge games is reflected in a sign she has posted in her kitchen: "This is the kitchen of Eugenia Tellef. I am the boss. If you don't believe it, start something."

Her spirit was also reflected at the bridge table. Recalling the first tournament she ever attended — in Worcester MA — Tellef said she started off against Oswald Jacoby in the Mixed Pairs. Jacoby opened 1 • Tellef recalls, and rebid the suit before becoming declarer in 3 NT.

Despite Jacoby's bidding, Tellef led a club. She recalls getting a glare from Jacoby. When she got in later, she returned another club — the only defense to defeat Jacoby's contract. She and her partner went on to win the event.

Tellef has entertained many celebrities at her home, including Jacoby, Charles Goren, Alvin Landy and Helen Sobel.

Tellef, who suffered three broken ribs in an accident the night of her retirement party, said she plans to get out more when she recovers.

Tellef acknowledges that bridge has been good to her. "I don't think there's another person in the world who has as many good friends as I do. It's been the happiest 52 years I could have had." New England Bridge Association
